Secrets to Bear Hunting Success

Foggy Mountain defines success as "bear on the pole." The reasons for our success are due to many factors. Here are a few...

Stand Placement

Many hunters ask the question "how do you pick your bait sites?" It is a good question and not as simple as some may think.

In order to pick a good bait site, the first step is lots of leg work. Bear need thick cover, water and food, so Brandon spends many days and hours walking the woods to find the perfect bait locations.

Thick Cover

Bear typically prefer habitat that is in or around cedar bogs or fir thickets.

Bear tend to move and bed throughout these thickets, and are much more comfortable and relaxed in this home habitat. Because they are relaxed, they lower their guard and will present hunters with a better chance of getting a clean shot.

Water

Bear typically like to go to water after they feed. Having a beaver bog, brook or lake nearby makes it easy for them to drink and then take a rest.

Proximity to water therefore helps keeps bear close to bait sites.

Natural Food

A bait should also be near a natural food source. This might seem illogical, but the reason for this is that our bait is not a bear's only source of food. It simply would not be enough for them.

It is only one of many edibles that bear will eat. Bear will still forage on things such as beech nuts, mountain ash berries, wild cherries, acorns, raspberries, blueberries, and wild strawberries.

Keeping the bait site near other food sources will also bring in other bears. Bear will roam many miles in search of food, and when they find a good source they typically stay near it.

The Challenge: Putting it all together

Placing a bait site between the thick cover, water source and natural food is no easy task.

Wind and terrain alter bear behavior. Forestry activities change the habitat. Weather changes food and water sources.

Once all those conditions are satisfied, we must also consider how a hunter will reach the site, and the big task of keeping the bear from circling behind and catching your scent!

Vast Territory

Foggy Mountain is fortunate that its hunting territory covers not one but two large regions of northern Maine.

Having this large amount of land also allows us to be sure our stands are placed in the most pristine locations, with the most bear activity.

Remember, you will be the first and only hunter to use your stand no matter which week or region you choose to hunt.

Bottom Line

Each bait site we place here at Foggy Mountain is in a spot selected for a reason. We have proved our system for selecting sites works time and time again.

Work never stops at Foggy Mountain. There is no "off season" for us. This is our full time job.

We are always working towards next year to make sure each year is as successful as the last. We love what we do. Your success is our success.

9 Minute Bear

Long time bear hunter Dennis Peacock is as lucky as they come. Dennis has harvested some nice bear with us, but this year was by far his quickest hunt.

With a rocky start (a cracked rim while on his way up to hunt with us), Dennis was ready to hunt the stand early Monday afternoon. We wished good luck to Dennis and his brother Scott, and then they were off.

About forty minutes later Dennis came cruising up the driveway and we knew something was up. As he pulled in you could hear the hoots and hollers.

As he got part way into his stand, he could see a bear paralleling him. As the bear moved towards the bait site, Dennis moved too.

Eventually Dennis was able to get into position near the bottom of his tree stand and get a clean shot at a nice bear.

Less than 9 minutes out of his truck and he ended his successful 2019 bear season!

Dennis proved the old wisdom that as soon as you hit the woods, always be ready. Bear are very unpredictable and you never know what might happen.

Bears feed on average for 20 hours a day. This means they are very active all the time. That is why here at Foggy Mountain we tell everyone to always be ready because it can happen the first minute or the last.

The State's bear biologists estimate that the areas of Maine where we hunt have population densities well over one bear per square mile. The thriving bear population is at a record high and is still growing rapidly.

Biologists at Maine's Fish & Wildlife Department continue their request for hunters to kill more bear. They have even been holding meetings to discuss how to achieve this goal.

Foggy Mountain knows how to help. We built a lot of new bait sites last summer. They instantly became active and we can't wait to hunt them next fall.

2020 Bear Hunts

Foggy Mountain's two most popular bear hunting packages are geared to suit everyone's individual needs.

Both hunts are in bear infested regions where we have hunted or performed field research for decades.

Bear hunting success is the same in both areas, but our accommodations are different:

- Lodging for our Katahdin-Highlands **Region** hunts is housekeeping style (each cabin has a full kitchen).
- Lodging for our West Branch Region hunts is American Plan (all meals are included).

Both hunts are on private lands with access controlled by gates, as are 95% of our total hunting territories.

Katahdin-Highlands Hunts

2020 Bear Hunts:

- Hunt August 31st (Arrive on the 30th) thru September 4th;
- or hunt September 7th (Arrive on the 6th) thru September 11th.

Maine's vast Highland Region lies between our base camp, Mount Katahdin and Moosehead Lake to the north.

West Branch Hunts

This hunt is in Maine's famous West Branch Region between Moosehead Lake and the Canadian border.

This bear hunt is tailored the same as our Highlands, Katahdin & Moosehead hunts, except you will stay in the comfort of a fully restored Maine Lumberjack Lodge. The lodge is designated as an official National and Maine Historic Site, and features original turn-of-century architecture and decor.

What's more, you'll enjoy homecooked, all-you-can-eat, lumberjack-style meals, reputed to be the biggest and the best in Maine.

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Spring Turkey Hunts

2020 Turkey Season:

Hunt May 4th to May 8th, or Hunt May 11th to May 15th, or Hunt May 18th to May 22nd, or Hunt May 25th to June 5th

Maine's turkey population is booming! Wild turkeys were re-introduced over twenty years ago and the population flourished thanks to the excellent habitat provided by Maine's reverting farmsteads.

Foggy Mountain's turkey hunts are in a region full of this prime turkey habitat, where it is common to get the chance to harvest multiple birds.



Rabbit Hunts

2020 Rabbit Season:

One to 5-Day Hunts December 1st thru March 31st Youth Hunters Half Price

Our action-packed Rabbit (Snowshoe Hare) hunts start at 8 AM when we head to prime rabbit cover and then turn our well-trained beagles loose. We put you in a prime crossing location while the beagles circle the rabbit back toward you.

We enjoy a break from all the action at noon for a tailgate lunch, then head back into the thicket for more afternoon action.

Weapon of choice is a shotgun (410, 20, 12, & 16) so this hunt lets everyone take aim at a rabbit in front of our beagles regardless of age or shooting ability.
